

PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends,

Generally speaking, at the polls on Election Day, people "vote their pocketbooks". It doesn't matter so much what the pollsters say about the state of national affairs or the domestic economy, if you're personal finances are suffering, you cast a ballot against the incumbent leadership in hopes of a change for the better.

Well, this isn't a letter to solicit votes. But it is a letter about our pocketbooks. Because much like in the voting booth, our tendency is to measure church stewardship in comparison to our personal finances. This is both necessary and prudent. We cannot pledge to give what we don't have. On the other hand, we can pledge to give. No matter if you are a newly confirmed teenager, a young adult with a spouse and children, a middle-aged empty nester, or a retired senior – we all can give.

We don't give because we have to – stewardship is not an obligation. We give because we need to – stewardship is a privilege. Stewardship is a unique and blessed opportunity that reflects our faith, hope, and trust in God. Figuratively speaking, stewardship is *faith with legs*. It takes what we say we believe and makes it tangible, concrete.

Among our Old Testament readings this fall, we've considered 1 Kings 3: 4-13. It is the account of young King Solomon's prayer. In this prayer Solomon doesn't ask for riches or fame, he simply and humbly asks for an understanding mind, *lev shome'a* – a Hebrew phrase which literally means, *a listening heart*. God was pleased to grant Solomon's request; King Solomon became forever known for his wisdom. The king wasn't wise because of an extraordinary I.Q. but because he was receptive to divine suggestion, he was aligned with holy intention.

The same can be true for you and me. We can ask for and receive from God *lev shome'a* – listening hearts. We can use our hearts to hear God's call to be good stewards – to manage our financial resources in a manner consistent with the faith that we espouse. Be part of our fall stewardship campaign; make your pledge today. Cast your ballot in favor of Bethel Church, in support of our ministry and mission, and in concert with God's grace and blessing in your life.


FLU SHOTS

HEARTS AND HANDS

World Diabetes Day is November 14th. Why should you care about diabetes? I heard an endocrinologist say "It's a tsunami!" **It's an epidemic: 9.3% of the American population has diabetes, with an estimated 80 million more with pre-diabetes.** Unless they have a change in their present lifestyle (start exercising 150 minutes/week, lose 7-10% of their body weight), they WILL develop diabetes within the next 5 years. Chances are that someone you care about is dealing with this challenging disease. Higher Education Scholarships: This scholarship fund, initially founded by Elvira and her family, was established to sustain Elvira's desire to support laypeople in their training for ministry and to further their faith journeys through a participatory level of church ministry and greater outreach into the worldwide community. The committee has now extended its reach to consider support for church members seeking post-high school assistance, such as colleges, universities, and trade schools on an annual basis. 
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LILLY'S FRIENDS OKTOBERFEST

about Lilly ...

Lilly Diuble is a crusader in the fight against blindness. Lilly has a genetic disorder that causes her to be hearing impaired and visually impaired. Her condition, which is believed to be Usher Syndrome, is a progressive disease that could

cause Lilly to become blind and deaf. If her hearing were to fail, Lilly is a candidate for a cochlear implant, but currently there is no treatment or cure for her blinding eye disease.

Since the age of seven, Lilly has been on a mission to fund research to find a cure for blinding eye diseases like the one she has. She and her family work tirelessly to raise money for the Foundation Fighting Blindness, whose mission is to drive research that would lead to preventions, treatments and cures for the entire spectrum of blinding retinal diseases.



Lilly has been the FFB VisionWalk youth chair for five years. She gives inspirational speeches to raise awareness and support for FFB. Her team, Lilly's Friends, along with her younger sister's team has raised over \$100,000 over the past five years for FFB!

In May of 2014, Lilly won the prestigious Prudential Spirit of Community Award which



recognizes young people for their volunteerism. Lilly has been featured on NBC Nightly News with Brian Williams twice during the "Making a Difference" segment. American Girl Magazine has featured her in a story called, "We Can Change the World".
